Tech Session with Social Distancing

Solving a Battery Drain Problem

At the last face-to-face planning meeting we had, I overheard Irene Breland talking about a problem she was having with her Morgan. If she didn't drive the car for a few days, the battery wouldn't have enough juice to start the car. I offered to come over and take a look at the car. Later, in email discussions with Mert Fox, he mentioned that his car is always on a trickle charger for the same reason. In keeping with the "social distance" guidelines, I offered to look at both cars.

Irene's Morgan is a 1966 Plus 4 and Mert's car is a 1993 XJS Jaguar. Electrically, these two cars are at the opposite ends of the spectrum. The Morgan has two fuses, one that goes through the ignition and the second is always powered. I downloaded the electrical diagram for the XJS. It was a 5.6Mb, 69 page pdf file. The XJS has 69 fuses in five fuse boxes. It also has 44 relays.

Even though they are very different cars, I attacked the problem the same way. The first thing I did was remove the positive lead to the battery. Using a multimeter, I set it up to read current. Most multimeters have the capability to read up to 10 Amps. There are fuses built-in to the meter which will blow if you try to pass more than 10 Amps through the meter. One lead of the meter I connected to the positive post on the battery and the other went to the positive lead I had just disconnected. So now any current coming out of the battery is going through the meter. Ideally, with the doors closed and ignition off, there should be no current, the meter should read 0.0. For older cars, like the Morgan, this should be true. For later cars, like the XJS, this is not true. Even with the car locked up, the battery is supplying power to computers, security systems and maybe a clock. In doing a web search, the XJS can draw 40 milliamps (ma) (0.04 Amps) when all is closed up. Just the security system alone can draw 28ma.

When I connected the meter up to the Morgan, with the key off, 0.016 Amps were being drawn. Irene mentioned that the volt meter in the dash was always reading a value, even with the key off. So I crawled under the dash and pulled the plug to the meter. The current went down to 0.009 Amps. Pretty close to zero but not quite there. Next, we looked at the wires going to the fuse that didn't go through the ignition switch. The radio power did go to the fuse that goes through the ignition switch. But there was an electronic antenna for the radio that required power and went to the fuse that was powered on all the time. I disconnected this wire from the fuse block and the current went to zero. So, in this case, the fix was to simply move the power wires to the electronic antenna and the volt meter to the fuse that goes through the ignition switch. In actuality, the radio reception was nearly nonexistent, so we decided to remove the electronic antenna. The antenna wire was about ten feet long so it cleaned up the wiring under the dash. I tried the antenna on a radio when I got home and it was not working.

When I connected the meter to the XJS, the current was over an Amp. But the drivers door was open and all the interior lights were on. So I removed the interior lighting fuse and the current went to 0.075 Amps. I then started pulling fuses. I started with the fuse next to the interior lights. The current dropped significantly. This fuse went to the right-side AC fan. To drop the current as low as possible, every other fuse in the car was pulled one at a time to see the effect in the current. There were some that dropped the current by small amounts. It was also noticed that if I manually pressed the drivers door switch, the current went down. This indicated that the door switch controlled things other than the interior lights. I did hear a click coming from the drivers' seat when the door switch was pressed.

The only fuse that was left out of the car was that for the right-side AC fan. With the doors and trunk lid closed, the car was drawing 11ma, 0.011 Amps. This is below what seemed to be normal for the car, the alarm system had been removed earlier. The battery voltage was monitored for the next few days and showed no signs of dropping. In doing a web search on the XJS right side fan controller, there is a transistor on the controller board that appears to fail. The \$8 transistor was ordered and should arrive the day the Windscreen goes out. So you will have to wait until next month to find the outcome. Yah, I know, the suspense is killing you!

Are among the great unwashed.


BCCC Zoom Meeting Minutes


